



Minor Varieties the in Rapids Design of Ivary Coast

Varieties in design are easily apparent on the high values of the Ivory Coast 1936 issue. Breaks are clearly visible in both the outer

side frame lines and the outer design lines.

Ten stamps of the type illustrated, show the breaks neatly. Referring to the millimeter rule alongside the picture, the numerals cited give the distance from bottom of stamp to the break. R or L indicates on which side of the stamp.

1.75f rose, R9 and spur of line between
the two border lines.
2.25f, L 32
3f, , L22 and 23 on same stamp; R 14; R 20

to 25, 4 breaks together; R28; R 32(2 copies); L 25

5f, L31, R 25, R26.

To locate these, project a line from scale to stamp, horizontally.

The Comoe Rapids design was first placed on sale at Paris at the Agence Comptable des Timbres-Poste Coloniaux, on Oct. 20 1936. Nine values have appeared, some with changes in color; and one without F R in the top left corner.

Additional varieties can be verified, plate location determined by multiple pieces --and followed through the life of the issue.

Book Review

Les Documents Postaux de la Guerre 1939-45. By Georges Chapier et Draim, and pierre Girard. Bischwiller, 1953, L'Echangiste Universel, 56 pp. paper, 300 francs (or from the author, G. Chapter, 117 Pierre Corneille, Lyon.

This is a list of all sorts of postal stationery originating in World War 2 in France.It is not priced, but is well illustrated, very well annotated as to use etc. of each. Interzone card material after the armistice is included. This whole collecting field seems never to have been adequately charted hitherto. The Chapier book appears to do this task, adequately and, we are reasonably sure, without any significant errors. Doubtless its appearance will call forth report of many an item not hitherto listed, but the owners had never bothered to show to compiling this book. S.G.R.

What Is it? on the A O F Airmail Type,

The Rising Airplane type of 1942, issued for a number of colonies in West Africa, and illustrated under Dahomey as type APS in Scott, shows a structure of some sort, at the extreme of the field.

Examination under the hand lens or even the microscope, however, does not bring out enough detail to identify the structure. Is it a shed or a parked truck, or what? Can anyone tell us with certainty? Your editor is puzzled by the inquiry of a member on this. He also will be glad to know, for if it is a truck, the stamps will qualify for his "Automotive" collection.

C. C. P. AWARD

for 1953

is won by

CHARLES NEIDORF

of the France & Colonies Group

for his serial on the Tour Hassan Issue, of French Morocco.



This lovely medal, in bronze, with suitable inscription, was awarded to Charles Neidorf for the best article in the Collectors Club Philatelist in 1953. His Tour Hassan serial, which is also the most coherent treatment yet given of making stamps by lithography and how varieties arise in that process, was judged against every article in the 1953 volume of that heavy journal, and unanimously considered best. The judges were men of high philatelic attainments, not one of them a member of the Group.

Presentation of the medal at the January 13, 1954 Annual Meeting of the Collectors Club, was a real feature of the evening. A goodly number

of our members were present.

Mr. Neidorf's Tour Hassan articles have been aseembled and published as a handbook. Orders for it will be filled via the Editor of the F.& C. Phil, at \$1.50 each post free; or it may be had direct from the Collectors Club. We get a commission if we can take 10 or more copies.

As is probably now well known, French stamps rather than colonial ones have been in regular use in Guadeloupe since Jan. 1,1949. It is an interesting question whether all French stamps current or is sued during the time since date have been sold in the post offices there.

One could probably obtain information on this by inquiry to the Postmaster at Basse-Terre. We have not yet taken this trouble. But, having examined a large amount of commercial mail from Point-a-Pitre, well spread over the years 1949-53, the following tally of the stamps found may give some idea of the general usage: ---

The "Universal Thin Spot" of the 5f Empire 1867

The normal presence of a thin spot, not at the edge of the stamp, nor yet where it be derived from carelessly pulling off a hinge, on copies of the 5f Empire, has been explained.

Our Group president, Mr. Brainerd Kremer, who does not recall the locus where he found the information, states that this stamp was kept in stock only in small quantities, especially in smaller post offices. The clerks would attach each copy of the few on hand, by a spot of its own gum, to a sheet of paper, and put this into the book whence stamps were sold.

When the stamp was pulled off and sold, very soft paper of the stamp, rather than that of the sheet which had carried it, tore away. The

result was the thin spot.

Every member is eligible to compete, whether resident or non-resident.

This contest is for 20th Century France or French Colonial Stamps

Two divisions: ---

Class A: original research on a single stamp or issue, 20th Century, of any French Colony, Offices Abroad, Mandate or Protectorate, or of France. Class B: studies of a single stamp or issue, 20th Century, of these same countries, but NOT primarily a job of research.

There will be awards in each section and a main prize for the best entry of any sort.

Collections previously exhibited at a meeting of the Group may be entered only when they have been materially altered by rearrangement, or by addition of new material, or in both ways.

There is no entry fee, but members who send in an exhibit have to pay return carriage also.

Judging of the exhibits will be restricted to material shown in the wall frames of the Collectors Club on the evening of March 2,1954. The Group will provide services of members competent to handle the material on that evening.

The judges will be qualified philatelic persons not members of the Group, chosen from such as are recommended by the Escay-Proof Society, the Philatelic Foundation, and similar bodies.

As the wall frames hold 12 album pages of the usual sizes, exhibits should be restricted ---there are 20 frames available, and an exhibit to fill one or two such frames is preferable. When an exhibit extends beyond this, it extends beyond the intended scope of the Contest.

Instructions for Competitors: --

First: As soon as you can, and before Feb. 25, 1954, notify Mr. Gustave Wittenberg, 106 Cabrini Boulevard, New York 33, N.Y. that you will compete and in which class, with the full name or title of your showing, and how much in frame space (21 usual size album pages to each frame) you need. Also, will you bring or send?

Second: Prepare your exhibit and, if it is to be sent in, start it in time. Send came of The Collectors Club, 22 East 35 St., New York 16, N.Y., addressed to the France & Colonies Group.

We hope to have at least 14 competing exhibits.

Have no inhibitions that your material is too little or too weak.

Likewise, the short time you have need not make you stay out. Anything worthy of entering can be gotten ready best ,when working under need to meet a time limit.

Previous competitors are not excluded.

On French stamps perhaps more than on those of other countries, color "shades" have a time order that is quite definite. Cancellation date will often enable one, using may copies of some particular stamp, to locate within a few weeks the first appearance of a particular color. The period of general use of such a color quite often ends rather abruptly, with only a very few scattering later uses. "Dated shade" collecting may well add materially to your enjoyment.

Sometimes a shade has two periods of use in the life of a stamp that served many years.
