











These stamps, which were previously pasted down, and bear faded SPECIMEN overprints presumably came from one of the collections of sample stamps sent to members of the U.P.U.




This is the only example I have of the red handstamp cachet which clearly associates this flight with the Tercentenary celebration

Mailed to a small village.




No Backstamp.




### The 1937 Changes:

Surface Rates to French Area raised in August
Airmail Rates to U.S. & France published in August
Foreign Surface Rates raised in October
Foreign Airmail Rates published in December

#### Airmail to North America

1937: According to Picirilli: 5 Rate Periods



23.MAI.38 10.75 = 1.75 + 3x 3.00 4<sup>th</sup> Period Rate 2 days early 26.AOU.38 7.75 = 1.75 + 2x 3.00 $4^{th}$  Period – 6 months

7.DEC.38 14.25 = 1.75 + 2.00 + 3x3.50 5<sup>th</sup> Period – 1 month





Mailed: 1.DEC.38 via Dakar

According to Picirilli:

Surface Postage: 65 Cent raised to 90 Cent on 12 Nov 1938

Airmail Charge per 5 grams:

Lowered from 18 Francs to 14 Francs on 22 Nov 1938

### Airmail to France "via Transatlantique"

Pan-American began service Between New York & France in "mid May 1939"

Rate was set at 15 Francs/10 grams By Decree of 19 June 1939

No First Flight covers.

The surface rate was 90 Centimes



My earliest cover: 29.JUIN.39 This combination is relatively common,

### Airmail to France "via Transatlantique"

#### In August 1939 Censorship began

Initially 4 elements:

Toothed Double Circle with Censor Number Sealing Tape with straight-line hanstamp: CONTROLE POSTAL MILITAIRE Pointed Oval: OUVERT PAR L'AUTORITE MILITAIRE

#### 18.OCT.39

Scarce early use of transparent tape This Censor confused his handstamps using the double circle to tie the tape & the pointed oval as a clear marking.




