

RAOL II _As WE REMEMber Him

Other than the short notice in the "Announcements" column in FCP #129, the Philatelist has not received any formal obituary of Raoul Lesgor, our founder, apparently owing to lack of biographical information and photos that were expected to be obtained from Marian, his wife, who has meanwhile removed herself from all contacts with former friends and customers. Consequently FCP asked members to submit any reminiscences and memorabilia they had of Raoul which we could extract and consolidate perhaps into a memorial in these pages. We so far have received only half-a-dozen letters in reply and will print excerpts from them serially as space permits, to be followed by our own memento with quotes from the lengthy correspondence I had with R. L. during his last years—R.G.S.

"He was in the Gallipoli campaign of WW I—for when I last saw him in N. Y. for the 25th Anniversary of FCPS we discussed war and swapped war stories. He told me of his WW I experiences."—Jacques A. Musy (16).

"I had known Mr. Lesgor since the founding of the France & Colonies Group. He was the original instigator for forming a small group of collectors in studying the stamps of France and Colonies. I always believed that he was more collector than dealer. He had a profound knowledge of these stamps and was always very generous in sharing his knowledge with the members. Dr. Vaurie and a few others joined him in forming the Group. It was not the intention that the Group become a philatelic society. He was born in the south of France and was quite an athlete in his day. I believe his game was soccer. He wrote several books which have become widely used by students and collectors of France. At our annual dinners, in the old days, he was the life of the party. He had his mandolin with him and played and sang French songs. It is quite different now. I have not been to a meeting in fully two years. Things are very different."—Louise Clemencon (19).

"As evidence that Lesgor did love stamps:—One day while I was hunting through a collection for cancellations in the hole-in-the-wall office he and Mrs. L. occupied on an upper floor in a Nassau Street building, Raoul straightened up from his close examination of an album he was appraising and broke the silence with 'I love French stamps!'

"In 1955 I made a date to meet him during the noon hour one day in Patterson, so that he could lead me to his place in Holmes where I was to work over some of his holdings in hope of finding something of interest. He met me per appointment (and my brother who drove me up from Darien), and insisted that we come up for lunch—which he cooked, including a wonderful cabbage soup.

"Lesgor drove George Weiler (former member), another collector, and myself back to New York late one night after a day and evening at the French exhibition that opened the Philatelic Museum in Philly in 1947, I believe it was. We got onto Raoul's 1914 war experiences. Among others: His unit was crossing a railroad bridge in the Balkans, and Raoul's job at the time was to lead the Captain's donkey across. The animal was having none of it. Curses, etc. Finally everybody else yelled that the bridge would be blown up in 2 minutes, and Raoul gained his point with Mr. Jackass. Going ashore in the Dardanelles, Raoul's outfit was wading toward the beach, guns in the air, when suddenly, as he recounted it, 'Quelle surprise!', they found themselves involved with underwater barbed wire. His 'quelle surprise' was something to hear.

"He was a great guy and sure could write a nasty letter when he got his

"Raoul Lesgor really seeemed to enjoy postage stamps and was able to create the same enjoyment of them in others. My interest in stamp collecting is due to an uncle, who insisted I must collect some country's stamps beside my own. Being able to read a little French I decided on that country. My uncle gave me some of his duplicates but I soon wanted more. He said the best dealer was Raoul Lesgor on Nassau Street. My family lived in Brooklyn so over I went and found Mr. Lesgor in his shop. He sold me some Ceres 1870, which I still have. I think that was in the late 1930s. I joined the France and Colonies Group in 1942 and the first meeting I attended was in a building on 5th Avenue just off 42nd street. I recognized Mr. Lesgor and remember Mr. Rich and Monsieur Gerard Gilbert. There was quite a discussion about something I knew nothing about. I decided I needed some books, so when Yvert & Tellier 1929 was offered for sale I bought it. Still refer to it sometimes.

"For years Mr. Lesgor helped me find Paris stars and addresses on cover and kept me supplied with the current French stamps cancelled in Paris. One summer he wrote me he had a fair Prussian blue Sage 1 centime. I promptly sent a check and soon his letter arrived with six Type Sage 1 centime green

stamps mounted on paper. The directions were that I was to pick out the Prussian blue without looking on the backs as only the real one was signed! My family gathered around and my eldest son picked the right one, but I have the stamp. What other dealer would take so much trouble.

"I believe the stamps he loved the best of all were the Bordeaux. Once I complained to him they were hard to identify. Much to my surprise and delight he wrote me to send him my collection and he would look it over. Of course it came back with reports and shades identified correctly.

"This is my memorial to Mr. Lesgor, whose honesty, knowledge, and enthusiasm were remarkable."—Marjorie B. Dayton (113).



"Enclosed is a photo taken of Raoul Lesgor in July, 1962, outside his home in Holmes, N. Y. The photographer unfortunately cut off the head of Paul Olson—a good customer and friend of Raoul for years, and the owner of a very, very fine collection of early issues of France, and a former member of F&CPS who has not been well, and resigned. Between Paul and Raoul is Mrs. Lesgor, and behind all of them one of their handsome rose bushes! As you may know, Raoul was open for stamp business at his home any Sunday except during the professional football season; he was an ardent fan of pro football! They both grew flowers galore; the ducks and chickens wandered in and out of the house while we were looking over Raoul's stock of French items on the kitchen table. He had wonderful items, priced very reasonably, and his vast knowledge of French philately overawed me constantly. He gave freely of his knowledge, thank goodness! We miss Raoul greatly; he is one of the last of the 'old school' of philatelists. But we shall always consider it our good fortune that we were privileged to have known him."—Richard Hamilton (769)

"I never met Lesgor personally, and only dealt with him for two years prior to his death. I have the correspondence. The biographical revelation which most astounded me was Marian's letter saying: 'Mr. Lesgor died this morning.—Marian Lesgor.' Raoul also wrote: 'We bought this old farm house in 1950, and I have been working at improving it since. And it is far from what people refer to when they mean a gentleman's farm. It is still an old barn.' '(We) conduct our business from an old farm in the sticks.' 'I was tempted to buy in Ardsley which is just around the corner, . . . that was in the early forties when I was not quite ready to leave the city.' 'Both my wife and I are 76 years old (8/12/66) and it shows, specially this year. I am very weak, and may have to sell out.'"—John E. Lievsay (1008).

ANNOUNCEMENTS AND NEWS

The new exchange controls of the French Customs require that all payments from abroad to individuals or firms in France must be made only by bank checks to a French bank or by international postal money orders to the recipient's C.C.P. number if he has one. (C.C.P. means "Compte des Chèques Postaux.") The FCP will hereafter cite the CCP number of publishers and other firms whenever appropriate and if known. Sending money by personal checks, cash, or other than permitted methods risks seizure by the customs.

The new Minister of the PTT appointed by Premier Pompidou is a Mon. Robert Galley. His background is in petroleum engineering, atomic energy production and administration, and the information and automation fields. He was recently Deputy of UDR from l'Aube and delegated to the Prime Minister in charge of scientific and atomic energy affairs. A Commander of the Légion d'Honneur, Companion de la Libération and Croix de Guerre 1939-45. His early pronouncements do not indicate anything very shaking in the offing but he will change priorities of objectives within the PTT program.

In addition to the new issues we mentioned in last FCP as due for the remaining months of the year, there will be the 0.45 Fr "Mouflon Mediterranéen" stamp in honor of the Fonds Mondial Pour la Protection de la Nature, to appear on 13 October. The Championnate de Canoe-Kayak stamp design will also be issued for Andorre (29 Sept.). Withdrawals from sale are scheduled for Gauguin's "Aréarea" (27 Sept.), "Danse" de Bourdelle (11 Oct.), and Roussel, Marceau and Ste. Beuve (18 Oct.), Chateau de Val, 0.25 Cheffer, Mont-de-Marsan, Armistice, Renoir "Portrait de Modèle" (25 Oct.); Tournee du Timbre (8 Nov.).

The UNESCO/Paris philatelic service for sale of its stamps has issued a catalogue of its wares issued since 1951 (stamps and FDC) which will be sent gratis. Service Phil. de l'Unesco, Place de Fontenoy, Paris 7.

For the Franco-German philatelique exposition held at the Institut de France in Berlin 19-21 April 1968, a souvenir card with French and German stamps was cancelled with a slogan machine cancel of the French Poste aux Armees in Berlin as well as a German illustrated cancel.

Several new specialist magazines have begun to appear in France recently: "Les Archives Erinnophiles," is a bulletin put out by the Societé "Arc-en-Ciel," c/o M. Bonneau, 13 rue du Mont Cassin, F94 Ablon, devoted to cinderella type material. "Le Collectionneur Lyonnais," will be published every three months by the Cercle d'Etudes Philatéliques et Marcophiles, c/o Dr. A. Camboulives, 19 rue Curie, Lyon 6. The magazine "Diligence d'Alsace" has been started (#1 in Feb. 1969) by the Amis de l'Histoire des PTT d'Alsace, B. P. 153 R46 Strasbourg, devoted to Alsatian postal history and philatelic activities.

Dr. William Stericker, nationally-known Philadelphia chemist and philatelist and President of the American Philatelic Congress died on August 14. He was the father of our Inini-specialist member Christine L. Blinn. Our sincere condolences to Mrs. Blinn and her family.

The experimental fully-automatic postoffice opened recently (May) by the PTT at Montgeron, outside Paris, has produced a surprise: a new coil version (hence Type II) of the 0.05 Auch stamp, which was specially made for the automatic vending machine at Montgeron and is sold at no other place. It was discovered by R. Ginestet and is described by de Lizeray in Le Monde July-August 1969 p. 51.

Complaints are very strong about the commemorative stamps of 1969 mostly being in denominations that do not fit the new domestic and foreign basic postage rates. The PTT has "explained" that this is because the engravings were prepared long in advance and the move of the printing plant to Perigueux prohibited extra work to change them. However, French philatelists tend to think it is probably intentional. Time will tell.

Printed matter sent in France at bulk rates may bear three types of cancel or precancel cachet: a) a machine postmark with "P.P" at top, put on by the postoffice. b) the sender prints on the wrapper with his masthead the words "Dispensé du Timbrage," and mail is sent out directly by the printer. c) sender prints on the wrapper a boxed cachet inscribed "PORT PAYÉ / PARIS R.P." and sends the mail out direct.

At the Philatelic Exposition held at St. Denis, Reunion, in connection with the Journée du Timbre in March last, our member Hardin Thweatt exhibited a "collection of old letters." The show was sponsored by the Assoc. Phil. de l'Océan Indien. Maurice Hoefflinger, long-time President of APOI nas returned to France and André Leblond has been elected to succeed him. It is remarkable that this 10-year old society now has over 250 members in that "tight" little far-off island.

CEPT, The Conference Européenne des Postes et Telecommunications. for which the member countries issue stamps each year in uniform design, is celebrating its 10th Anniversary this year and has added two new members: Malta and Yugoslavia. All the countries of western Europe, plus Greece, Cyprus, and Turkey were already members. It is sort of a regional UPU and tends to present a united front at UPU conventions.

The philatelic review "Documents Philatéliques" published by the Académie de Philatélie of Paris is celebrating its tenth year of issue. FCP salutes DP and wishes it a continued success on the high plane of excellence in philatelic research maintained since its founding. (The level is comparable to the Collectors Club Philatelist and London Philatelist.) The present editor is

Pierre de Lizeray. It comes out 4 times a year and costs 50Fr/yr. (Académie de Philatélie, C.C.P. Paris 1436-63.) The Académie itself is celebrating its 40th Anniversary.

Georges Rigol, Conservateur of the Musée Postal in Paris, has been named an Officier in the Ordre National du Mérite.

The editorial office of Le Monde des Philatelistses has been moved to 11bis Boulevard Haussanmn, F75-Paris 9. The busines soffice for subscriptions, etc., is still at 7 rue des Italiens, Paris 9.

Réné Hinard, an old-time Paris dealer (of Neuilly) died in May, Many Americans were among his happy customers in years past.

Feuilles Marcophile, the very informative journal of the Union Marcophile (to which a number of FCPS'ers belong) has come forth in a new format starting with #175 (1969) and a new editor. The former editor, Georges Petit, was unable to keep up any longer the enormous labor of putting together such a heterogeneous compilation as FM used to be. The new editor, Dr. P. Lejeune, a well-known postal historian and marcophilist member of the Académie de Philatélie, will run mainly articles instead of notes, but the question and answer section which has been so popular will be continued. The printing is now from type on a calendered paper.

Those who have taken to collecting Napoleon I items (this is the bicentenary of his birth) will want to study the article by J. Brumeaux (En marge de bi-cent. Nap. I et les T.P.) in Le Monde, running serially since Jan. '69.

The recent devaluation of the franc has made prices of new issues from France cheaper but there are indications that prices of much of the older material in France have gone up proportionately if not more. The uncertain financial outlook in France has, it is said, stimulated demand for stamps as a hedge against inflation or deflation.

The postal history of the Channel Isles (Guernsey, Jersey, etc.) seems to attract much interest among French collectors, probably because of the close geographical, historic and linguistic relations to France. The establishment of independent postal services for Jersey and Guernsey was to take place on Oct. 1 and a group of French philatelists planned to fly over for the ceremonies. No doubt the issuance of separate stamps for the Isles will increase interest in France and who knows perhaps they will start listing them in the French specialized catalogs.

The well-known expert and dealer Aimé Brun of Paris died on 15 August. He was publisher of the valuable series "Cahiers Philatéliques," a member of the Académie de Philatélie for 30 years and inscribed on the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists in London. His son Clement continues the firm.

The 30c (0.30 F) Republique ("Marianne") of Cheffer and Durrens was reissued in early July printed by typography, but without any publicity or fanfare—there was no first-day celebration but it is said the first ones went on sale at Paris about 7 July, and gradually supplied to other postoffices a little later.

A very careful and extensive review of the "Encyclopédie des Timbres-Poste de France, Tome I" by our President Marc Martin appears in Collectors Club Philatelist, for Sept. 1969, pp. 305-307. He has also prepared a Table of Contents (in English) for the book, which is deposited in the Collectors Club library with their copy.

Statistics is a wonderful thing! As of Dec. 1968 the PTT had 336,000 employees, 19,033 postoffices, 103 guichets mobiles, 1058 silent bureaus, 16 sorting machines, 14,402 motorized carrier routes, 23 airplanes, 64 railway cars, 12 highway buses, and 34,113 other vehicles.

That sprightly magazine Philatélie (have you seen it?) recently held a stamp designing contest for its readers (and amateurs), offering a series of prizes. The subjects had to be those for which France had issue stamps since the first Journée du Timbre stamp. There were 400 designs submitted. The main winning "maquettes" are illustrated in the issue #22 for July-August 1969. Several of them impressed us as very fine. It is clear that the contestants or at least the judges favor designs without borders or frames. The jury noted that the results were generally inspiring though not very original. Reasons for each award are stated. We particularly liked the Protection of Nature design by R. Salmon and the Bayard at Pont du Garigliano by B. Gissinger.

The plans for PHILYMPIA 1970 (Sept.) international Philatelic Exhibition in London are progressing. The 150 stands of the bourse have been let, mostly to British but also to 20 American dealers, plus a few German, Canadian, Swiss, Japanese, Spanish, Swedish and Irish dealers.— No French, probably on account of the exchange-control difficulties. Over 1000 people from U. S. have already booked air flights for the show.

PRESIDENT'S LETTER

It is with great satisfaction that we can report a very large gain in our membership during the last 6 months. We wish to welcome all these new members to the France & Colonies Philatelic Society and assure them of the sincere desire of our group to share with them any available information or knowledge that they may require in this most interesting field of French and French Colonial philately.

It is quite difficult and outrageously expensive today to collect ALL France and Colonies. Indeed there are over 20,000 (20,332 to be exact) catalogued major varieties, not counting listed minor varieties, imperfs, deluxe

sheets, proofs and essays, locals, special issues not in Scott, etc., etc. If one adds cancellations on stamp or cover, and stampless covers, the total becomes staggering. New issues, incidentally, increase the total by 450 to 750 yearly (an average of about 550 a year for the last 10 years). Obviously a collector has to try to concentrate his interest and his purchases on certain issues or on a particular period.

In regard to French stamps, the following periods might be distinguished: 1849-1870—The "classical period" of the 2nd Republic, 3rd Empire and the provisional issues of 1870: Scott #1-49 and J1-J4.

1871-1900—The semi-classical period of the 3rd Republic during the late XIXth century: Scott #50-108 and J5-J28.

1900-1940—The period of the 3rd Republic during the XXth century: Scott #109-414, B1-B114, C1-C17 and J29-J68.

1940-1944—The II World War period of the "French State" (Vichy): Scott #415-474 and 496-498, B115-B190, J69-J79.

1945-1958—The 4th Republic period: Scott #474-495 and 499-903, B191-B328, C18-C36, J80-J92.

1959-to date—The 5th Republic period: Scott starting from #904, B329, C37, J93.

The same dates are valid for the majority of French colonies or former colonies which became independent during the '50's and '60's.

It is to be noted that standard albums do not usually recognize different historical periods and consequently any specialized collecting should be done on blank album pages. A study "in depth" of a chosen period subject or theme will be enhanced by covers, cancelled stamps and other pertinent collateral materials. Available time, particular interests and budgetary considerations together with a practical plan of what to look for, are the foundation for this rewarding hobby.
