CAMEROUN – FRENCH ARMED FORCES MAIL DURING PEACETIME

privileges (franchise militaire, F.M.) during wartime. The markings on their mail help document military campaigns. However, armed forces personnel also send mail during peacetime. This article presents selected examples of peacetime mail sent by French naval personnel aboard ships that visited Cameroun prior to independence and also French armed forces stationed in Cameroun in the years preceding and following independence. In some cases, the senders enjoyed free franking. In other cases, full postage was paid. The post cards and covers display a variety of military cachets and also the use of French F.M. stamps.

Discussion of the franchise militaire is beyond the

scope of this article. The reader should consult Ref. 1 and other published literature for details. The observations about free franking during peacetime are based on the material described below.

The naval sloop Cassiopée patrolled the coast of equatorial Africa in the years immediately following World War I. The Cassiopée made several visits to Douala during the early 1920s. The cover in Figure 1, with manuscript F.M. notation and naval cachet, is postmarked Matadi à Boudeaux A March 5, 1921. This canceller, a replacement for the L.L. No. 1 cancellers, lost when the Afrique sank in January 1920, was assigned to the paquebot Tchad (Ref. 2). The Cassiopée visited Douala on Match 19-29, 1921, about two weeks after the

cover was posted.

The Cruiser Primauguet (Figure 2) arrived at Douala on February 3 and departed on February 10, 1931. The post card in Figure 3, sent during the visit, was postmarked with the cruiser's datestamp on February 8, 1931. The sendeither was among the crew of the Primauguet or one of two smaller accompanying na-

val vessels, the Tigre or the Chacal. No franchise militaire concession was available at this time. The 15 centimes Cameroun postage stamp paid the reduced tariff for printed matter bearing only the sender's signature and a short message (Ref. 3).

Free franking was apparently reinstituted, at least for some naval personnel, during the period prior to World War II. The cover in Figure 4 (on page 6) was sent by a crew member of the warship D'Entrecasteaux. There is no F.M. marking on the cover, but the naval cachet authorized free franking for letters. The 3-franc stamp paid the air mail surtax from Cameroun to France for a letter weighing less than 5 grams (Ref. 3). The cover is postmarked Douala January 6, 1939. The D'Entrecasteaux arrived at Douala on that day and departed four days later, on January 10. The previous and the next port of call were both listed as "inconnue."

During the immediate pre-war period, a number of French submarines also called at the port of Douala, among them the Achille, Ajax, Archimede, Argo, Centaure, Monge, Pasteur, and Pegasse. The post

card in Figure 5 (on page 6), sent by a crew member of the submarine Surcouf, is annotated F.M. and sent postage free. The postmark is Douala April 27, 1939. The Surcouf had arrived at Douala on April 21 and departed on May 7. The previous and the next port of call were both listed as

"inconnue."




Figure 6. Air mail cover sent by a crew member of the Croiseur-Ecole Jeanne d'Arc, January 18, 1947.

The post-war cover in Figure 6 is postmarked Croiseur-Ecole Jeanne-d'Arc January 18, 1947. The sender was not entitled to free franking. The 8 franc Cameroun air mail stamp paid the 2 franc fee for letters within the French community plus 6 francs per 5 grams air mail surtax (Ref. 3).

While compiling material for our book about the postmarks and postal history of independent Cameroun, to be published in 2014 – a blatant publicity plug! – we found a number of covers – both




Figure. 7. Cover sent by a crew member of the Croiseur Jeanne d'Arc, Douala, January 20,1958.

pre- and post-independence – franked with French Franchise Militaire stamps and cancelled with a Cameroun postmark. The earliest cover to hand (Figure 7), sent by a crew member of the Croiseur Jeanne d'Arc, is postmarked Douala R.P. January 20, 1958. A previous port of call had

been St. Helena as attested by the picture on the photo side (Figure 8) and the written message.

France continued to station troops in Cameroun after independence on January 1, 1960. The cover in Figure 9 is postmarked Douala R.P. June 17, 1960. The military cachet is for a French battalion garrisoned at Douala

talion garrisoned at Douala.

The cover in Figure 10 bears the F.M. stamp

with the French tricolor. The postmark is Douala R.P. Tri No. 8 August 14, 1971. Tri, in this case, is guichet or postal wicket. The Armee de l'Air

military cachet is, however, not French but Cameroonian – the two stars in the center represent the République Fédérale du Cameroun.

Information about ships – including naval vessels – calling at Douala was published monthly in the Journal officiel du Cameroun (Ref. 4) for the period December 1918 through July 1939. Publication was in part on a space-available basis, as some months were omitted. Publication

of ship traffic ceased with the outbreak of war on September 1, 1939 and was not continued again afterward.

Information about peacetime French military mail associated with Cameroun and especially covers with earlier and later use of French Franchise Militaire stamps would be most welcome.

A Rather Special Postcard

y book, "The Sower, A Common Little French Stamp", was kindly reviewed by Stanley Luft in the France & Colonies Philatelist in April 2013. The postcard depicting the Sower, shown in Figure 1, is illustrated on the front cover of the book.

name was Rida Roty. Rida had an illustrious ancestor, Louis-Oscar Roty, the designer of the Sower.

The Sower, La Semeuse, is unique in philately. Since her first appearance on silver coins in 1897,

she has graced the coins and postage stamps as the symbol of France for more than a hundred years.

When I expressed my interest in his family history, Rida Roty sent me copies of the postcard that had been written by his forebear in 1905, and autographed for the benefit of an admirer. He kindly agreed to let me display the postcard on the cover of my book, which has now been published by the Society.

Much of this article previously appeared in the Journal of the France & Colonies Philatelic Society in June 2013, but I thought it might also be of interest to American readers because of its New York connection.

It was thanks to eBay that I came across this postcard. Some years ago, having bought an interesting but entirely unrelated cover, I corresponded with the vendor and learned that his

We corresponded further, and to my delight I have

been able to purchase the original postcard. It now feels very much at home in my collection! Rida has also provided me with much background information which may be of interest.

Louis-Oscar Roty

Louis-Oscar Roty was Rida's paternal great-great grandfather. Born in Paris on 11th June 1846, Roty studied art under the sculptor Augustin

Dumont and the engraver Hubert Ponscarme, and quickly gained a reputation as a sculptor of medals and bas-reliefs. He exhibited at the Salon from 1873, and won the much-coveted Grand Prix de Rome in 1875, enabling him to further his studies in Italy. In 1885 Roty was awarded the Légion d'Honneur. In 1888 he became the youngest member of the Académie des Beaux-Arts de l'Institut Français, and in 1897 its president. That was the year in which La Semeuse, originally designed as a medallion for the Ministry of Agriculture, was selected as the motif for the new issue of French silver coins. Roty won the Grand Prix in 1889 and again in 1890 at the Exposition Universelle, and was made a Commander of the Legion of Honour. Roty died in Paris on 23rd March 1911. Many of his designs and examples of his work are preserved at the Musée Oscar Roty in Jargeau (Loiret).

Théodore Rivière




Figure 2 - The reverse of the postcard

Roty wrote the postcard on 25th May 1905, and signed the illustration of the Sower with his name, Oscar Roty, in response to a request from Alice Rivière, the daughter of the sculptor Théodore Rivière. The postcard, duly franked with a 10c Sower stamp (naturally) was posted at Place Chopin (Paris 16e) and addressed to Miss Rivière at her father's home, 99, rue Mozart in Paris (Figure 2). The reverse of the handwritten postcard is illustrated in Figure 2.

Roty wrote his message to Alice with typical modesty. The transcription and my translation are as follows:-

"Quoique rentrant chez moi horriblement fatigué je

vous envoie cette reproduction qui est par hasard supérieure à ma composition première. Je t'embrasse et je suis tout à toi si tu avais besoin d'un r e n s e i g n e m e n t " O . R o t y

"Although returning home dreadfully fatigued, I send you this reproduction which is by chance superior to my first composition. I embrace you and I am all yours if you need any information. O. Roty."






Figure 3 - The statuette of Oscar Roty by Rivière

Alice's father, Théodore Rivière, was an eminent sculptor who was born in Toulouse in September 1857 and died in Paris in November 1912. He sculpted the bronze statuette of Oscar Roty which is illustrated in Figure 3. Casts of this sculpture are displayed in the Musée Rodin in Paris and in the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York.

Roty's talents were appreciated by his professional colleagues and fellow artists. He was great friends with Louis-Eugène Mouchon (1843-1914) who engraved the dies for the early Sower stamps, and he and Mouchon regarded each other with great affection and respect.

FRENCH AND FRENCH COLONIAL REVENUE STAMPS AND WATERMARKS

he idea presented below is not new – I raised it before (Ref. 1) - but perhaps the audience is.

How many of our members collect French or French colonial revenue stamps?


Figure 1. Watermarks AT36, AT43 and AT47.

During the middle years of the 20th century, many revenue stamps were printed on paper watermarked multiple AT and two numbers (Figure 1). AT = Atelier du Timbre and the numbers are the last two digits of the year that the paper was

manufactured. The numbered watermark was probably a security feature.

For Cameroun revenue stamps, I have recorded year numbers between 36 and 66. This threedecade range is probably representative for France and throughout the French community. Since France continued to supply revenue stamps for Cameroun after independence in 1960, the AT watermark is found on revenue stamps issued after the end of French administration.

Duston, for example, noted which stamps were printed on watermarked paper (Ref. 2). Some effort has been made to catalogue different color tints of the paper, the range of shades for the printed stamp, the shade of ink used to add the colony name, and the position of the colony name on the stamp (Ref. 2-3). This can be challenging because paper becomes toned with age and ink can fade and/or perhaps wash out when stamps are soaked.

A number of Cameroun revenue stamps saw extended use over many years and underwent multiple printings. This would account in part for the occurrence of different tints of the paper, shades in the color of the ink, and variations in the position of CAMEROUN. However, none of the cata-



that stamps printed at different times were printed on paper with different watermark dates. As an example, I have in my collection the 10-franc

stamp shown in Figure 2 watermarked AT47, 49,

10 Franc revenue stamp on watermarked paper.

50, 52 and 57. The paper tints and/or ink shades are visibly different. The 100-franc stamp from the same series has watermark dates from AT36 to AT58, a span of 22 years,

again with tint and/or color differences.

So my idea – for each revenue stamp, include the watermark date in the catalogue listing. There could well be a correlation with paper tints and ink shades. The need to focus on tints and shades could, in large part, be obviated.

Informative? – Yes. I have gained some further insight into, and appreciation for the stamps in my collection.

Practical? – Most likely not! Most revenue stamp collectors are probably not interested in such detail and, given the infrequent offering of revenue stamps by dealers and at auction, it would be virtually impossible to prepare any listing that would begin to approach completeness.

Nonetheless, for Cameroun revenue stamps, I will continue to compile watermark date information and broaden my collecting enjoyment. What about you?


SANDICAL SCHEDULE

PREFACE

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St. Pierre & Miquelon The 1942 Vichy "Ghost of RF" Varieties

r. Roland Janniere of Paris, France has pointed out an interesting variety on the 10f and 20f values of the St. Pierre and Miquelon Vichy pictorial stamps issued in Paris in 1942 (Taylor, 2001). These two horizontal format values show the sea stack (rock formation) at Anse Aux Soldats (Soldier's Cove) á Langlade. They are normally without the intertwined RF monogram in the lower right corner of the design which appeared on the prewar original version of the same design.

The two original issues with the clear RF monogram in the lower right are identified in the Mau-

ry catalogue (2010-2011) as numbers 195-196 issued at St. Pierre on 17 November, 1938. The Vichy stamps without the RF monogram are Maury 302-304. The Vichy stamps were never issued on the islands. The stamps "without RF" Vichy stamps were not, until recently, listed in Scott, but mentioned in a footnote. The original with RF are Scott 203-204 while the recently listed "without RF" Vichy stamps are Scott (2013) 299D and 299E. These two stamps f with RF type are illustrated for the 10f deep blue and 20f olive green as the top illustration in Figures 1 and 2. Mr. Janniere identifies two states of the "without RF" Vichy issued stamps, the "without RF" and a

new variety I call "ghost of RF". A copy of the prewar issue with the full monogram in the lower right corner is shown for comparison and the two 1942 states are illustrated below the 1938 stamp

in Figures 1 and 2.

Figure 3 is an enlargement of the lower right of the 20f showing the "ghost of RF". It is interesting

to speculate on the origin of the two states. Perhaps early efforts to eradicate the offending RF monograph were only partially successful, before a printing of both values with the "ghost of RF" variety was made. Or perhaps a worker at the printer Hélio-Vaugirard in Paris left a "ghost of RF" as a patriotic gesture. Additional work must have been done to hide the RF monogram before more printings were made. The sans RF stamps were sold in France but were never sold at island post offices. The "without RF" stamps are fairly common but the "ghost of RF" variety takes some searching and remains unlisted in Maury or Scott.



Editor:

Many thanks for the article in the October 2013 issue of the France & Colonies Philatelist about your fascinating 1940 air mail cover from Martinique to Brazzaville. I particularly appreciate Dick Stevens deciphering the air mail surtax. Figuring out how the cover travelled to reach its destination is indeed a challenge. Air mail services to, from, and within Africa were indeed fluid during World War II, especially after the fall of France. However, a lot of information has recent-

ly become available, not the least of which are the Pan American Trip Summaries, based on extensive and exhaustive research by John Wilson at the Richter Library, University of Miami, Flori-The entire Trip Summary records are now available as a free download on the web site of the West Africa Study Circle, at www.wasc.org.uk/. World War II Red Cross Message Sheets

essage sheets from the Red Cross were occasionally used during World War II. This message sheet was sent from Paris, France to the Belgian Congo. On the front it has a Lisbon, Portugal July 20, 1941 transit cancel and a Red Cross Leopoldville, Belgian Congo Cachet, Croix Rouge de Congo. On the reverse there is a July 21, 1941 Lisala, Belgian Congo transit cancel.

Sometimes mail from home to a soldier at the front did not always get through or was very late.

The folks at home would worry when they did not hear from their soldier, son or husband. Thus the Red Cros undertook the task to make connections under certain circumstances. This is one of those connections undertaken by the Red Cross. This specific message is a contact between a wife in France to her husband in Belgian Congo.


